

Let us be Slow to Speak James 1:19

The observation has been made that our ears are out in the open, exposed and unguarded while our tongues are concealed behind ivory bars. James wrote "Wherefore my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath." To be slow to speak is to speak in a careful manner, allowing our words to be the result of a thought process, rather than to speak in haste. Solomon said in Proverbs, "He that keeps his mouth keeps his life."

Our speech can be negative and can in some cases incite anger. Proverbs 15:1 says, "A soft answer turns away wrath, but grievous words stir up anger." Speech can be dirty, and that comes from a dirty mind. Paul wrote in Colossians 3:8, "Put filthy communication out of your mouth." Our words can consist of no purpose at all and we're told in the scriptures that we will give an account of every idle word we've spoken. Words can violate the trust of another person. Again it was Solomon who said, "A talebearer revels secrets: but he that has a faithful spirit conceals the matter" (Prov. 11:13) Paul writes to Timothy warning him about gossip and what it can do, so our words can be those of a busybody.

Not only can our speech be negative, but it can also be positive. Our speech can be used to tell the truth. It can be used to share Faith. It can be used to confess what we believe. Romans 10 says, "with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." Our Speech can Honor God, Hebrews 13:15 speaks of the sacrifice of praise which is the fruit of our lips. Ephesians 4 talks of speech that edifies, we are always trying to find ways to build others up, well our speech can do that. And lastly, our speech can be used to spread the Gospel.

"Think before you speak." We've all heard that. That's why God say, "Be swift to hear, slow to speak...."

The Value of Worship

In January 2000, Barna Research Group published a survey concerning church attendance that was very alarming. Their survey showed that only 40% of American adults attend church services on a typical weekend (www.barna.org). How shocking that 6 out of every 10 people don't attend church services regularly! Of the sixty percent who don't attend church regularly, an estimated twenty percent either don't believe in God or have no desire for religion. But what about the other forty percent who don't attend? These may not attend church services regularly because they have not realized the inherent value of worship. What makes worship so valuable?

Our Creator. A knowledge of and a personal relationship with God makes worship essential to the Christian life. It is in worship that we praise and magnify God for who He is and what He has done for us (Jn. 4:24). When worshipping God we realize our purpose in life is to glorify Him in every way (Isa. 43:7). It is this close communion with God that makes us humble ourselves and focus on eternity (James 4:10, Eccl. 12:13-14). The Lord's brother sums it up by saying, "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you" (James 4:8).

Our Bible. Studying the Bible makes worship an invaluable time for us. Job said, "I have treasured Your words more than my necessary food" (Job. 23:12). Our Lord encouraged us to "hunger and thirst after righteousness" (Matt. 5:6). Many people today are starving for spiritual food. Worshipping God through the study and preaching of His word is one way we can fill this void. Please note that in the Bible, worship is not an option it is a must (Jn. 4:23-24).

Our Impact. The impact of worship on our own lives and the lives of those whom we contact makes worship vital. Studies show that those who go to worship live longer. The factors for this longevity of life are prayer, stress relief, inward peace and acceptance. Man has always tried to find ways to make life longer. Here is one proven way to increase the length of one's life. Studies also show that the impact worship has on our children is essential. Barna Research Group found that 61% of those who attended church regularly as a child still attend regularly as an adult. But sadly 78% of those who were not taken to church as a child do not go to church regularly as an adult. For the sake of your own soul and the soul of your children please attend worship where the truth is taught.
